
The Southern Baptist Theological Seminary

SW700 Baptist Beliefs

Description: Prepare to be tremendously enriched by this course on doctrine. The seminary's

president and four of its deans/provost will introduce you to eleven doctrines of faith. They will teach as they would to church members or lay people on an undergraduate level. We believe you will find the text to be both readable and enlightening. Grades will be based on short quizzes given and graded by SWI faculty. The quizzes will cover study guides, notes and lectures. We predict you will use what you learn in this

course for years to come. You will also gain a greater appreciation and

understanding of what your husbands spend years studying.

SW701 Baptists Then and Now

Description: Baptists Then is a short course in Baptist history that encompasses the first

three weeks of this six week course. Topics include: the origins of Baptists and Southern Baptists; key personalities and events as the convention grew; and controversies such as

anti-missionary schism, the Landmark Movement and the rise of liberalism.

Baptists Now seeks to explore the programs and structure of our denomination. We will trace the Cooperative Program and show how it is known as the most effective and efficient denominational mission system in the world. The roles of our Southern Baptist seminaries and agencies will be laid out. We will also look closely at our missionary sending agencies through the eyes of those who have been commissioned as missionaries. All of these elements will be studied from the perspective of a ministry wife who wishes to be better informed about our denomination.

SW702 Discipleship I (required)

Description: Through this course we will examine the state of our spiritual life using both text

books. Students will learn more about personal spiritual disciplines and practice them in a way that helps us to better know God and draw nearer to Him. As we work to cultivate and maintain a healthy spiritual life we will also incorporate topics such as gratitude, biblical friendship, remembering and celebrating God's goodness to us, and practical tips for building habits and making time in our busy lives. Writing one's personal testimony is also a part of this class as is a brief Zoom meeting with SWI faculty to discuss the class. Our prayer is that at the end of this course we will have a healthier spiritual life and we will have grown in maturity as

Christians.

Description: Join us for 12 sessions in just three days! Considered to be the core courses in our

practical curriculum, Essentials I and II deal with your calling as a Christian and a ministry wife; marriage from both a Biblical and practical perspective; your influence on children as well as many other practical areas that apply to ministry life including mentoring, time management, listening and discerning skills, hospitality, starting well/finishing well in various settings and more. You will glean so much wisdom from these three days as you learn about many different topics from many different ministry wives—all of whom have a passion for their particular topic. Short

assignments are given for each of the 12 sessions.

SW706 Family Life Conference

Description: We offer our Family Life Conference in mid September of **even numbered years** on

campus for SWI couples only—and husband are required to attend this event that starts with dinner on Friday night and ends before lunch on Saturday with teaching sessions with Dr. and Mrs. Hershael (Tanya) York. SWI provides meals and a course booklet but the cost of the course is the usual \$20. We encourage Async SWI students to make plans to attend if at all possible but we now have an alternate plan. Dr. and Mrs. Ware were speakers for a marriage conference and we have gladly secured the audio links to it. Students and their husbands must listen to the sessions

together and the wives must complete a short written assignment related to each of

the sessions.

Description: This course will challenge you in personal evangelism, give a variety of practical

helps in how to share the gospel and help you answer some of the challenging questions people have about the gospel. Some specific topics that will be covered are: giving your personal salvation testimony, how to share the Bridge Illustrations, the importance of prayer in evangelism, how to use creative ideas for the purpose of evangelism, how to share the gospel to children and how to do basic follow up of a new Christian. Accountability groups of three will be used to continue spiritual

disciplines and to gain practice in presenting some of these methods discussed.

SW708 Leadership Skills for Women

SW710 Closer Look at Theology: The Centrality of Scripture for the Christian Life

Ferguson (The Banner of Truth Trust, 2014) ISBN 9781848712423

Description: Learn what makes the Bible a fully unique book, and the most important book for our

lives. Marvel that it comes from God, with God's own revealed words and divine authority, and so it alone can guide us faithfully and accurately in what we believe and how we should live. Attention will be given to Scripture's inspiration, inerrancy, illumination, and sufficiency. The course ends with considering how we may best read and digest the Bible for our everyday lives. Quizzes over the lectures and a

short paper at the end are the assignments for this class.

SW711 Closer Look at the OT: Amos

Description: Through this study of Amos, we will be reminded of the importance of the Word of

God in our lives. The aim will be to make the messages of this book come alive for the students by paying particular attention to how God uses human agents to accomplish His purposes. Special emphasis will also be placed on developing a theology of ministry so the students will have a sounder biblical understanding of God's claim upon them and their husbands. Students will complete the study

questions at the end of each chapter as assignments for this class.

We will consider the defining of your roles, conflict management, the specific needs of your husband, and ways to nurture your marriage and keep it fresh and growing. Included will be

resourceful ideas for developing other family relationships such as in-laws and children. We will be encouraging and challenging each other as we enjoy our God-

given responsibilities and opportunities of family.

SW714 Ministry of Hospitality

Description: Join us for this elective as we explore the many methods of practicing hospitality. We

will first look at the biblical mandates and examples from which we can learn so much. We will then look at the areas specifically related to ministry. Some of the many topics include serving your own family, recipe and menu organization, event planning at home and at church, etiquette, hospitality in writing, evangelistic

hospitality and overcoming challenges. Students will have the opportunity to demonstrate hospitality as a part of this course by choosing an area in which they deem they need to improve. Practical assignments correspond to the weekly topics.

SW715 Women of the Bible

Elective Class

Text: Assigned portions of the Bible

Description: The Bible mentions 187 women by name and refers to hundreds of nameless

women. We can learn priceless lessons from them to see what God wants to teach us on how to be a godly woman; on the other hand, we can also learn from others in God's Word some mistakes to avoid. In this course we will take a look at Esther, Ruth, Jochebed (Moses' mother), the Hebrew midwives, Naaman's wife's maid, the Proverbs 31 woman, Rahab, Lydia, Mary and Martha, Mary, the mother of Jesus, Lois, Eunice and others. We will also learn how to do a biographical Bible study. Students will be expected to write a personal application from the life of each woman we study to turn in weekly, and will choose a woman about whom to write a

biographical study to turn in at the end of the course.

SW716 Introduction to Biblical Interpretation

Description: The purpose of this course is to introduce students to the goal of interpretation. In so

doing we shall look at the part that the Holy Spirit plays in interpretation, how to arrive at the meaning of biblical text as well as their present day implications, and to learn how to interpret the various literary genres (poetry, prophecy, parable, etc.) found in the Bible. These professors will teach this important class on a certificate level, as is the case with all SWI classes. They will provide a plethora of resources related to the book, including powerpoint presentations, lesson plans, discussion guide, etc. The goal is that students will be prepared to teach a group of women in their church a class on biblical

interpretation.

SW717 Closer Look at New Testament: Mark

Description: This course will be an exegetical study of the Life of Christ in the Gospel of Mark. The

focus of the course will be the biblical text with attention given to how the life of Jesus is relevant and applicable to our lives and ministry in the 21st century. Dr. Cook's new

book will be the text. Quizzes will be given over each session.

SW719 Cross Cultural Ministries

Elective Class

Out of print but a free copy will be sent to registered students on request.

Description: The course introduces the Biblical foundation for missions. Contemporary issues will

be explored including: the appointment process, cross cultural communication,

practical issues in the missionary life. Guest speakers related to both NAMB and IMB will be a part of this class as well. Students will be expected to complete weekly assignments and participate in class discussions. Students will complete a final project based upon the student's integration of class lectures and resources, with her own personal pilgrimage. Students should complete and upload the survey posted

on Canvas once they register for the class so as to help determine specific desired

content for this unique class.

SW720 Seminar Saturday

Text: Students will choose one book to read from the resource list given for all seminars

Description: We are making this on campus event available as an elective course for Async

students by allowing them to listen to 8 of the 9 one hour seminars by audio recording. We regret we do not have video recordings. On campus students who attended this event in March 2022 were given the option to attend 5 seminars and listen to 3 others by recording and then write 8 one page papers about what they learned, plus read one book and write a book review, so we are duplicating those

SW721 Redeeming the Time

(You will also choose a second book from an approved list to be given at the first class

meeting)

Description: This course will seek to explore the value of time management as it applies to

ministry wives. We will first look at the Biblical basis for setting goals and priorities. Various types of organizational styles will be outlined. We will look at how issues such as perfectionism, procrastination, and the inability to say "no" hamper effective

time management. Many practical issues will be discussed in detail including

planners; handling paper; avoiding clutter; home management; housekeeping and kitchen organization. Assignments will involve directly applying principles discussed in class and briefly reporting on progress made. This course is aimed at challenging

those who are already skilled in areas of organization and mativating those who have
those who are already skilled in areas of organization and motivating those who have room for vast improvement.
